



2024 Program Impacts

Advocacy

- >>> Stopped a harmful city planning policy in Rancho Cordova.
- Made Polluters Pay via three State bills.
- Led local efforts to expedite the transition to clean, renewable energy.

Education

- >>> Provided climate justice training and paid internships to 30+ high school students.
- >>> Hosted six college students and recent grads in new workforce development program.
- >>> Provided 10 workshops on climate-related topics.

Community

- >>> Hosted two major events with a combined attendance of almost 400.
- >>> Bolstered grassroots efforts with 100+ new volunteer signups and eight new partnerships.
- >>> Built omnichannel outreach strategy.

Advocacy Impacts


Advocating for Cleaner Air, Environmental Protection, and Healthier Communities

>> Stopped a Harmful City Planning Policy

As co-plaintiffs, 350 Sacramento and Oscar Balaguer filed a lawsuit against the City of Rancho Cordova in October 2023 in response to the City's attempt to pass a non-compliant "Climate Action & Adaptation Plan."

We were able to successfully show that the policy they were trying to adopt was not compliant with California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requirements for being a feasible, effective, enforceable plan. As such, it would have cleared the way for dangerous land use development projects that could harm residents with excess pollution and environmental damage.

Successful Result: The City of Rancho Cordova agreed not to adopt the deficient plan.

>> Made Polluters Pay

Working closely with coalition partners, 350 Sacramento advocated for robust legislation that would put the cost of cleaning our environment where it belongs: oil and gas companies. Three of the Make Polluters Pay bills we advocated for passed:



<u>AB-1866</u> Idle Oil Well Cleanup Act: Requires oil and gas companies to clean up idle oil wells in a timely manner (with high fees if they don't) to keep communities safe from toxic chemicals.

<u>AB-3233</u> Local Environmental Choice And Safety Act: Empowers cities and counties to regulate or prohibit oil and gas operations in their jurisdictions to protect public health and the environment.

<u>AB-2716</u> Low Producing Well Accountability Act: Imposes fines on low-production oil wells, holding polluters accountable in the largest urban oil field in California.

Bonus Bill: <u>AB-2196</u> Beaver restoration program.





350 Sacramento participated in nonpartisan **Get Out the Vote (GOTV)** efforts across the Sacramento region.

<u>Prop 4</u>: California voters approved a \$10B bond for safe drinking water, wildfire prevention, clean air, and the protection of communities and lands from climate change.

>> Participated in Multiple Actions

350 Sacramento and our volunteers participated a variety of actions in 2024 - protests, marches, school strikes, petitions, forums, and public comments. Examples include:

>> Moved Sacramento Toward Clean Energy

350 Sacramento leads local efforts to replace oil and gas with cleaner, safer energy sources, helping residents protect their homes, communities, and environment from harmful pollution.

Energy Justice

In 2024, 350 Sacramento joined more than a dozen independent 350 affiliates around the country in a coordinated utility justice campaign. Because Sacramento already has a public utility (SMUD), we are focusing on SMUD's clean energy and community assistance programs.

Our SMUD Watch Team engaged SMUD board members, securing their commitments to:



- Continue making measurable strides toward the Zero Carbon by 2030 goals.
- Review and (possibly) modify their methane emissions reporting processes.
- Hold a Community Solar Forum in 2025 to discuss increasing support for customer and community solar projects.

Electric Schools



Interns from our youth education program spearheaded efforts to help Sacramento City Unified School District obtain grant funding to begin electrifying school buses and buildings. With guidance from our Electrification Team leader, this success sparked a district-wide commitment to adopt clean-energy transportation and infrastructure solutions by 2035.

Education Impact

Empowering People through Climate Education and Workforce Development

>>> Strengthened Our Youth Education Program

In 2024, 30+ local high school students participated in our Student Environmental Activist Training (<u>SEAT</u>) and paid internship program, to enhance their climate knowledge, leadership skills, and experience.





In April 2024, we began partnering with the Refugee Enrichment & Development Association (REDA) to provide multi-lingual educational materials, translation services, and other outreach pathways. This partnership helps ensure students in refugee and immigrant communities have equitable awareness, access, and opportunities to participate.



>> Youth Achievements & Impacts

We actively support and encourage young people to share what they've learned in our programs with their families, friends, classmates, and educators. Youth-driven advocacy is an important way to scale the impact of our climate justice efforts across generations. To name just a few youth-led achievements:

- 2 designated youth seats on the Board of Directors.
- 2 New High School Eco Clubs, including one student-led climate coalition and the newly established 350 Granite Bay High School. (@350GBHS)
- Helped a local school district apply for and obtain grant funding to transition to electric school buses.
- Drafted a bill proposal to establish a Youth Advisory Council on the California Air Resource Board, which an Assemblymember agreed to author. (AB 2125 was substantially changed in Assembly since its introduction in February 2024, but it will be revisited in 2025.)
- Earned the Environmental Council of Sacramento (ECOS)

 <u>Environmentalist of the Year: Rising Star Award</u>. (Anushka Kalyan)
- Initiated and held leadership roles organizing 350 Sacramento's 7th Annual Ode to Earth Festival, a community celebration of the arts, culture, and the planet.

The forum focused on how communities can benefit from regenerative farming practices – which can help sequester carbon and benefit people, our planet, and the economy.





Up Next in 2025

Building upon our 2024 successes, in 2025 we will:

- Make polluters pay (more).
 - Collaborating with local and statewide partners, we will continue pushing elected officials and business leaders to put the cost of cleaning our environment where it belongs the oil and gas companies.
- Oversee local climate planning activities.
 In the immediate future, we will provide support for the Sierra Club
 (Mother Lode/Sacramento chapters) in their efforts to hold Sacramento
 County accountable for a CEQA-compliant Climate Action Plan.
- >>> Expand our youth education & workforce development programs.

 37 students are already signed up for the spring SEAT session. We will also increase our college and business partnerships to empower young people with new opportunities to grow in their academic and professional climate careers.
- Focus on the intersection of climate, housing, and public health.

 Working with partners such as the Sacramento Environmental Justice
 Coalition, we will take a more holistic, intersectional approach in our
 climate advocacy, education, and community outreach efforts.
- Promote clean energy solutions throughout the community.

 The Electrification Team and SMUD Watch will continue to stand up for equitable, renewable energy solutions that will lead to cleaner air and healthier communities in Sacramento (and beyond).
- Implement a new, evidence-based community outreach strategy.

 Between our <u>new website</u>, leadership training series, and small-group outreach plan, we will bring in even more people to join our climate justice efforts, strengthening and growing the movement with each new voice.
